**ABRAHAM LINCOLN,** by James M. McPherson. (Oxford University, \$12.95.) In an introductory biography of just 79 pages, McPherson, the Pulitzer Prizewinning author of "Battle Cry of Freedom," delivers a speedy narrative but no superficial treatment.

**A. LINCOLN:** A Biography, by Ronald C. White Jr. (Random House, \$35.) White's major one-volume study covers all the bases while adding newly discovered papers and exploring the religious aspects.

**A WORLD OF TROUBLE:** The White House and the Middle East — From the Cold War to the War on Terror, by Patrick Tyler. (Farrar, Straus & Giroux, \$30.) In Tyler's vivid account, few of the presidents impress.

**THE INHERITANCE:** The World Obama Confronts and the Challenges to American Power, by David E. Sanger. (Harmony, \$26.95.) The Times's chief Washington correspondent argues that Obama's choices will be more constrained than he has acknowledged.

**THE OTHER SIDE OF DESIRE:** Four Journeys Into the Far Realms of Lust and Longing, by Daniel Bergner. (Ecco/HarperCollins, \$24.99.) Unsettling but riveting case studies of eccentric sexual yearnings.

**THE BLACK GIRL NEXT DOOR:** A Memoir, by Jennifer Baszile. (Touchstone/Simon & Schuster, \$25.) Baszile's middle-class family were determined not to veer off course in their pursuit of the American dream.

**IN OTHER ROOMS, OTHER WONDERS,** *by Daniyal Mueenuddin. (Norton,* \$23.95.) The eight linked stories here follow the scheming lives of a rich and powerful Pakistani family and their employees.

# Paperback Row

THE LAST FLIGHT OF THE SCARLET MACAW:
One Woman's Fight to Save the World's Most
Beautiful Bird, by Bruce Barcott. (Random House,
\$15.) This story of a bitter fight against a dam in
western Belize — the home of the bird in the title
— combines "adventure travel, biography and nature writing in a steamy climate of corruption and
intrigue," our reviewer, Elizabeth Royte, said. Barcott writes "with a deep understanding of so many
environmental issues and their larger context" and
makes his complicated story dramatic and comprehensible.

MY REVOLUTIONS, by Hari Kunzru. (Plume, \$15.) In Kunzru's third novel, a failed '60s radical involved in a series of bombings now lives a middleclass life under an assumed name. He encounters figures from his past who threaten his carefully constructed identity. "It is a measure of how respectfully Kunzru, pictured at right, treats his characters' yearning for a more generous time that 'My Revolutions' feels less like an elegy for their era and more like a requiem for our own," Will Blythe wrote in the Book Review. Peter Carey also makes imaginative use of political outlaws. HIS ILLEGAL SELF (Vintage, \$14.95) is the story of the son of underground radicals who is kidnapped, by a friend of his mother's, from the wealthy grandmother who is raising him. They end up living among "B-list hippies" in Australia, where the boy discovers that his captor is not, as he had fantasized, his mother, and the two develop a kind of love as she recognizes she must return him.

**CONDOLEEZZA RICE.** An American Life: A **Biography,** by Elisabeth Bumiller. (Random House, \$17.) "Her real ideology was succeeding," Bumiller, a Washington reporter for The New York Times who covered the White House for five years, says in this interesting portrait of the first black woman

secretary of state. Bumiller follows Rice from her childhood in a striving middle-class home in Birmingham, Ala., through her academic career and her move into the government. Drawing on 10 interviews with Rice (and 150 more with others), and writing without polemic, Bumiller depicts a woman who excelled at attaching herself to mentors, notably George W. Bush.

THE CIGARETTE CENTURY: The Rise, Fall, and Deadly Persistence of the Product That Defined America, by Allan M. Brandt. (Basic Books, \$24.) Brandt, a Harvard professor of medical history, examines the culture, politics, law and global spread of the cigarette. "It seems striking that a product of such little utility... could be such an encompassing vehicle for understanding the past," Brandt writes. But "the cigarette permeates 20th-century America as smoke fills an enclosed room."

**THE MUCH TOO PROMISED LAND: America's Elusive Search for Arab-Israeli Peace,** by Aaron David Miller. (Bantam, \$16.) This "nonfiction bildungsroman," as Ethan Bronner called it in The Times, depicts Miller, who spent nearly two decades involved in Middle East peace negotiations, as "someone who slowly and painfully learns that the . . . conflict is far more complicated than a contest between good guys and bad."

YALO, by Elias Khoury. Translated by Peter Theroux. (Picador, \$16.) Growing up in war-torn Beirut, Khoury's protagonist joins a militia, works for an arms dealer (and has an affair with his wife), and robs couples at a lovers' lane. Yalo's narration, delivered to an interrogator after his arrest, suggests many versions of the truth. He is "brutalized and brutal, tortured and repentant, ... a man seeking redemption," Adam LeBor said in the Book Review.

NO WAY HOME: A Dancer's Journey From the Streets of Havana to the Stages of the World, by Carlos Acosta. (Scribner, \$16.) As a poor child in Havana, Acosta wanted to play soccer, not study ballet. His memoir describes how he eventually fell in love with dance and pursued his art outside Cuba, which he deeply missed. Acosta "spent years in blunt defiance of his calling," our reviewer, Jennifer Balderama, wrote. But "despite it all, when he finally leapt, he flew."

**THE SPARE WIFE,** by Alex Witchel. (Plume, \$15.) Witchel's satiric novel is set on the Upper East Side, at the intersection of the superrich and the media elite. The spare wife of the title is a beautiful widowed model turned lawyer, and the villainess a scheming editorial assistant who wants to expose her affair with a prominent doctor. The story has comic energy and an air of insider dish.

MIRAGE: Napoleon's Scientists and the Unveiling of Egypt, by Nina Burleigh. (Harper Perennial, \$14.99.) Napoleon's occupation of Egypt in 1798 was a brutal fiasco, but the 151 "savants" — geologists, mapmakers, naturalists — who accompanied the troops were more successful. Besides discovering the Rosetta stone — bargained away to the British — they compiled a 24-volume encyclopedia of Egyptian natural and political history, including descriptions of the Pyramids and details of daily life.

**JUDAS HORSE,** by April Smith. (Vintage Crime/Black Lizard, \$13.95.) An F.B.I. agent in Oregon infiltrates a cell of domestic terrorists posing as animal rights activists in this psychologically and morally complex thriller.
